Mortimer Funston went to Williamsport where he passed a very creditable examination for State mounted police, on Monday.

A Polander of Muncy Valley, who is a victim of consumption, and had recently become a charge upon Davidson township's poor fund, was taken to New York by overseer George Kiess, Wednesday of last week and the next morning he was placed aboard a steamship and sent back to his native country where he has relatives to care for him.

Blackbirds may now be legally killed in the state of Pennsylvania for the first time since 1878. A protective law was passed at that time which has been in force ever since, until the last legislation enacted its general game bill.

In addition to the blackbird the open season commenced on Friday, September 1, for these:

Railbird, reed bird, dove, sandpiper, tatter, curlew, or any other shore bird; Wilson or Jack snipe, wild goose, wild duck, brant, swan, coot and mud-hen.

The open season will continue until January 1, in all cases except that of the jack snipe; the season for that bird extends until May 1.

The complete protection was removed from blackbirds by the last legislature because the birds are being killed in the south annually in great numbers. In many parts of the country below the line the blackbird is regarded as a pest and is shot and allowed to rot upon the ground.

In Pennsylvania the flocks of the birds frequently become a nuisance. Those birds that are shot in this state are not to be allowed to rot upon the ground, for the Pennsylvania hunters regard the blackbird as a toothsome morsel.

Because, it is alleged, he wrote to a young girl of his flock, seeking an appointment, and in the case of another girl, a member of his choir, but sixteen years old, he made questionable remarks, the Rev. George H. Easterday, minister of the Lutheran church at Millville, found the church door locked when he went to hold services Sunday evening. All this is changed now. members of his flock are indignant at his alleged actions. Sunday morning Easterday preached a powerful sermon. During the afternoon the Board of Trustees held a meeting and, after listening to the stories of two or three young women, passed a resolution asking him to resign. The minister came to the church to hold the usual Sunday evening service, but found the church locked against him, and immediately left town. Mrs. Easterday has been staying with her parents near Gettysburg for some time.
