The board of County Commissioners have ordered that part of the old county building, in which E. J. Mullen has his law office, be fitted up for a place in which to confine youthful prisoners when the Sheriff has any such in his care. The State prohibits confining children with older prisoners.

The friends of Dr. J. C. Edgar, of this county will be sorry to learn of his recent painful accident which as recorded by his town paper, the Holestein, Iowa, Advance, says in part:

"Last Monday while Dr. Edgar was driving toward town the front wheel of his buggy came off and the doctor in trying to get out, fell to the ground, breaking his left hip bone and one rib. His horse having stopped at the command, but for an hour the injured man stood in the road waiting for some one to come his way and help him to town. The doctor is now getting along as well as can be expected. Dr. Edgar has no doubt done more driving than any other physician in northwest Iowa and this is the first serious accident that has happened to him although he has had numerous narrow escapes.

"He has a host of friends who regret to hear of his misfortune and hope to hear of a speedy and complete recovery."

The meetings held at this place Wednesday afternoon and evening conducted by Mr. Deemer Beidleman, head of the Evangelistic Tour Party, were much appreciated by Sunday School workers who took the privilege to attend the sessions. For various reasons Mr. Beidleman was the only member of the party to reach Laporte, but as he is the possessor of energy and grit the meetings were full of interest from beginning to end. He believes in making Christianity a business, and puts this theory into practice in his own work. He is intense, earnest and practical in his remarks, and his illustrations cannot help driving home some forceful truths to most of his hearers.

Without a doubt his tour through this county will result in much good in creating a new interest in Sunday School work.

Senator LaFollette, of Wisconsin, won a notable victory in the senate when his bill limiting the hours of employment of railroad employees was passed by a vote of 70 to 1. The bill as adopted by the senate is as follows:

"That it shall be unlawful for any common carrier by railroad to require or permit any employe engaged in or connected with the movement of any train carrying freight or passengers to remain on duty more than 16 consecutive hours, except when by casualty occurring after such employe has started on his trip or by unknown casualty occurring before he started on his trip, and except when by accident or unexpected delay of train schedule to make connections with the train on which such employe is serving he is prevented from reaching his terminal; or to require or permit any such employe who has been on duty 16 consecutive hours to go on duty without having had at least 10 hours off duty or to require or permit any such employe who has been on duty 16 hours in the aggregate in any 24-hour period to continue on duty without having had at least eight hours off duty within each 24-hour period.

That any such common carrier or any of its officers violating any of the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1000.

Astronomers who have been predicting that there were spots on the sun and that the orb would never give off the heat that it has been furnishing to Mother Earth in the years gone by have had their theories shocked by the mildness of the winters of 1905-6 and 1906-7. During the few weeks of the season not one day has the temperature reached zero.

Since December 19, according to the weather reports, there have been but eight clear days. In the 28 days since the 19th day of last month there have been 21 wet days and a half dozen mornings have been marked by heavy fogs. Prior to 1905, the mildest winter was that of 1890-91.
