Wright's 25 hens averaged 29 eggs a day for the period named. A Florida poultry raiser reported the same record and was awarded half the \$25 prize, the Huntingdon merchant getting the other half. Last March Mr. Wright's egg production from 110 hens amounted to 2,088 eggs.


