Met Death at Long Brook.

Horace Wilson, son of George P. Wilson of Unityville, met his death at Long Brook, Wednesday night. Mr. Wilson who was engaged in teaching school at Nordmont and boarded at the home of Joseph Pennington, was in the habit of getting on the late South bound train and going to Long Brook to call on friends. As was his custom Wednesday evening he boarded the train and went to Long Brook where he got off. On Thursday morning his lifeless body was found under the railroad bridge at that place. It is not known how the accident occurred. It is believed he started to walk across the bridge and in the darkness lost his footing and fell to the ground. A wound on the head which doubtless was sustained by striking on his head was the only bruise on his body which is evidence that he was not struck by the engine. The sad and sudden death of Mr. Wilson has cast a gloom over Nordmont and vicinity. He was about 21 years of age.

Clyde Davis of Ellenton, while working in the woods near that place Monday, met with an unfortunate accident. With a sharp axe he was cutting a limb off a tree, when the instrument slipped and caught his left foot, cutting one toe off and badly gashing two others.
