Who is to pay a county deputy's expenses when he visits a grange to install its officers?
If a deputy goes by order of the state master to install officers he draws pay from the state grange, but if on invitation of subordinate granges the visiting grange would be courteous if it paid him expenses at the least, but it is not obliged to.

The national grange executive committee held a joint meeting with the special committee on grange life insurance at Albany, N. Y., on April 25.
