Many mills and factories which shut down at the time of the threatened panic, throughout the country, are rapidly resuming operations.

Misses Julia Farrel of Dushore, and Miss Florence Farrel of Lestershire, N. Y., spent several days of last week with the Misses Marcella and Lizzie Farrell at this place.

Twenty-five of the leading farmers around Elmira have organized for the purpose of breeding Holstein cattle.

A chicken pie supper will be served at the home of Mrs. A. J. Hackly, Saturday evening, Feb. 1, by the ladies of the M. E. Church.

The Grange National Bank at Hughesville, which was to have opened on the first of the year, but on account of the building not being completed in time, will open on February 1.

Frank Schrader died at Laddsburg, on January 22, of Pneumonia, aged about 50 years. Deceased was unmarried, and is survived by four brothers and two sisters. They are George Schrader of Athens; Wm. Schrader of Ovid, N. Y.; Edw. Schrader of Hillsgrove; Chas. Schrader of New Albany; Mrs. J. T. Waltman of Sayre, and Mrs. F. S. Ritter of Philadelphia.

Lloyd McCarty died January 27, at his home at Hughesville, of consumption. Mr. McCarty had been a resident nearly all his life of Penn township, Lycoming county. He was by trade a plasterer and stone mason, and often worked in this county where he was well known and held in esteem. Deceased was nearly sixty years of age.

On Wednesday last the court granted 1125 licenses to sell liquor in Schuylkill county. The revenues from these will be over \$125,000. The Law and Order society stated to the court that Schuylkill county has more than one-tenth of the entire number of Saloons in the State and made an earnest plea that no new licenses be granted.

Hon. T. J. Ingham, County Solicitor, who took upon himself the arduous task and responsibility of collecting taxes for Davidson township when that township was left without a collector, has been doing remarkably good work in that line. Since the middle of November Mr. Ingham has collected over \$4,200 of tax money, of which \$2,400 has been paid to the schools of Davidson, and a large amount gone into the county treasury. Had these taxes not been collected, it can be readily seen the serious and difficult problem the schools of that township would be facing; also the loss to the county would be heavy. Although the taxes are yet not all paid, Mr. Ingham is hopeful of securing the greater amount still due the township. He has cause to feel gratified with the service that he has already done, and for which he not likely expects to receive adequate recompense.
