Ten Pennsylvania towns are af-

horses. Four hundred of the ani-

ing the disease. It is not conta-  
gious but highly infectious.

Conferees on the widows pension  
bill, at Washington, reached an  
agreement on Monday by adopting  
the bill practically in the form  
passed by the house. It increases  
from \$8 to \$12 per month the pen-  
sions of widows of soldiers of the  
Mexican, Indian and Civil, and  
will increase the pension list about  
\$12,000,000.

The annual season for brook  
trout opened Thursday and closes  
with the night of July 31. The  
streams are in better condition  
than they have been for several  
years at the opening of the season,  
on account of the ice leaving the  
streams early.

Henry Kraus last week butchered  
a steer which dressed over 1200 lbs.  
When brought to town from the farm  
of William Warren in Forks Town-  
ship, the animal tipped the beam at  
2,200 lbs.

The children of the Odd Fellow's  
orphanage at Sunbury spent a week

the orphanage.
