Beginning with last week, the

Twenty thousand pensioners,

pension agency, are affected. Most  
of these now receive \$8 a month.

The Teachers' Summer School

what earlier than in past years.

term of school that will give to

our town had this school and the  
people appreciate the kindness of  
the Superintendent in holding it  
at Laporte this season.

Joseph Morris, who fired the last  
shot of the Civil war, died in Potts-  
ville Friday. He fought with the  
Seventeenth Pennsylvania Cavalry  
and the Forty-eighth Pennsylvania  
Infantry. Morris claimed that when  
word came on the battle field of  
Lee's surrender and the rebels had  
laid down their arms one of them  
savagely attacked him. A bullet  
from Morris' musket, the last shot  
of the war, silenced the enemy.
