The Income Tax.

No set event of the present week may be anticipated with keener news relish than the vote which may be taken in the Senate Friday on the income tax amendments to the Tariff bill. Second only to the adoption of the rejection of this important tax feature of the pending legislation will be the interest in the alignment of Senators with the Republican "Regulars," on the one hand, opposed by the Democrats and a doubtful number of "Insurgent" Republicans. Senators Bailey and Cummins, representing, respectively, the Democrats and such Republicans as are determined upon an income tax amendment will probably be determined upon an income tax, appear confident that their compromise amendment will be adopted but before hour of voting is reached strong pressure will be brought to bear in opposition, upon such Republicans as in this matter are allied with the Democrats. The preliminary skirmishes earlier in the week will whet the news appetite for the feast of Friday. The income tax amendment will probably be defeated by a very small majority, but at that there is a chance that it may pass. There is enough doubt in the situation to cause considerable interest in the outcome.
