

Whereas, There is reason to believe that the disease known as rables on hydrophobia exists in Cherry and Colley Townships and Borough of Dushore, and the nature of this disease is such that for the present all dogs, within certain limits must be suspected of being capable of

must be suspected of being capable of spreading it, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, by authority of the State Livestock Sanitary Board under the provisions of the Act of March 27th, 1903, that all dogs in the above described district are hereby de-clared to be in a state of quarantine, and must be strictly confined or firmly secur-ed on the premises of their owners, and not allowed to run at large or enter pub-lic highways exceepting when led or when muzzled with a well fitting muzzle that will effectually prevent biting.


