MILLIONS FOR EDUCATION

Wealthy Grocer Leaves Three Institutions Over \$275,000 Each.

Chicago, Jan. 3.—Thomas Murdock, of the wholesale grocery firm of Reid, Murdoch & Co., whose will was probated here, left \$2,750,000 to three educational institutions, the American Sunday School Union, with headquarters in Philadelphia; the Chicago Y. M. C. A. and the Presbyterian Hospital of Chicago. Each institution will receive something over \$900,000.

There is a proviso attached to the gift to the American Sunday School Union to the effect that the money must be spent in the territory produced over by F. O. Kinsler, who formerly worked here and for whom Murdock had high regard.

HUNTSMEN FROZEN TO DEATH

Probably Fell Exhausted After Reaching Shore from Overturned Boat.

Wildwood, N. J., Jan. 3.—The bodies of two well-dressed hunters who had been frozen to death were discovered on the bank of Swayne's Channel, near here. The dead men were identified by gunners' licenses in their pockets as Julius W. Uher, 33 years old of Camden, N. J., and J. W. McFarland, 19, of Wildwood trust. The men had been dead evidently for at least two days.

Ray Lamphere Dies in Prison.

Chicago, Dec. 31.—Ray Lamphere, convicted of arson in burning the home of Bella Guinness, on the Guinness farm near La Porte, Ind., April 28, 1908, died in the Michigan City Penitentiary of consumption. He had been sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment.

White Man Lynched in Oregon.

Canyon City, Ore., Dec. 28.—Orville Snyder, who killed Arthur Green in a row on Dec. 24, and later surrendered, was taken from Deputy Sheriff J. H. Casady yesterday and lynched by five masked men and then shot to death.
