The end of the murder trial of Alfreda Cassalanova, charged with the killing of Tony Verano on the street at Bull's Head near Scranton during the noon hour, Jan. 27, came suddenly Thursday last week at Scranton when the defendant withdrew his plea of not guilty and plead guilty. The plea of not guilty was made with the understanding that the court would classify the degree as a second. Sentence was at once pronounced, Judge E. C. Newcomb sentencing him to an indeterminate term of from five to twenty-five years in the Eastern penitentiary. This is the only sentence provided for second degree murder in the indeterminate sentence act. Cassalanova and his attorneys lost no time in taking advantage of the chance to plead guilty to second degree murder.
