Vanderpool had been on a spree and after a trip to the East Side Hotel which is now occupied by a Vanderpool family at which place he created a disturbance, he returned to Towanda and was immediately nabbed by an officer and placed in the jail. After a short sleep on a cot in the cell he arose and proceeded to make things lively by tongue lashing a gang of hoboes who were lodging in a part of the building.

Not being satisfied with this he desided to burn them up and set fire to his matress.
