A short distance below Satterfield near the horseshoe curve the train began to gain speed owing to defective air brake connections and in a short time was going at a teriffic pace. Brakemen in the caboose endeavored -to crawl over the cars to set the wheel brakes but were unable to do so. Before the Dushore trestle was reached the caboose was cut loose from the rest of the train which in a short time had gone from sight, tearing across the trestle at about 45 miles an hour.
