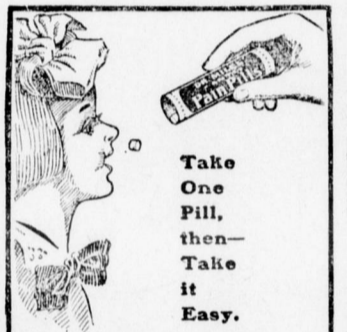

It is with a less personal interest that they turn to the political and general news.

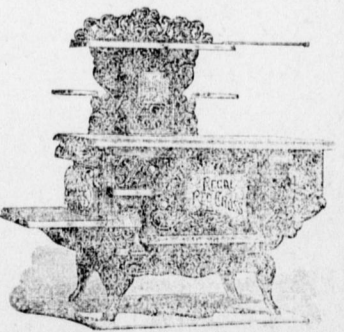
Retail advertising is to the home keeper what the crop news is to the farmer, what the wholesale market reports are to the grocer. Women naturally feel this alert interest in the advertising, because it is full of information essential to their efforts to make the family income accomplish the largest results. Merchants who fail to cooperate with this effort by an adequate public statement of prices and values, are simply ignored in the apportionment of domestic expense.

When a politician's name is rarely seen in the dispatches, the voters assume he is out of the game. When a merchant's name rarely appears in the advertising, the women assume he is lost in the shuffle. No business enterprise can afford to ignore the women.
