Mrs. Finan will be under the doctor's care for some time. The buggy was reduced to kindling wood.

George Heckner Held on Charge of Murder.

Last Wednesday, George Heckner, the young Polander of Hills-grove, who was arrested for the murder of Mary Sheppa was given his second hearing before Squire Caven at this place. The following witnesses were introduced by the Commonwealth: Julia Sheppa, Charles McBride, Henry Messi, Joseph Puerrri, Harley Long, Reno Green, John Orhil, Ralieggh Bienlich, Floyd Keeney and others.

The Commonwealth produced evidence that George Heckner and Mary Sheppa were intimately acquainted with each other and that on several occasions they were seen together on the little foot bridge that spans the Loyal Sock creek near which the dead body of the girl was found. Heckner is a fireman at the Hillsgrove tannery, working from 12:00 noon until midnight. He was seen talking with Mary Sheppa in the fire room at the tannery on the night of the tragedy. His whereabouts on that night are not definitely known as his room mate, Joe Puerrri was considerable under the influence of liquor and does not have a clear idea of what was going on.

After hearing the evidence, Squire Caven decided that it was a case for the Grand Jury to pass upon at December term of Court. Heckner was committed to jail.
