Blackleg.

Owners of livestock in Sullivan County whose cattle are exposed to the infection of Blackleg or black-quarter, may have their cattle vaccinated against this disease by the State Livestock Sanitary Board without cost to the owner of the cattle by complying with the following rules:

1. A letter asking for the vaccination shall be written and mailed to Dr. C. J. Marshall, Secretary of the State Livestock Sanitary Board, Harrisburg, before April 1st, 1912.
2. The letter shall contain the name and address of the owner of the cattle, a statement as to the location of the farm on which the animals are kept and the number and kind of animals in the herd.

Vaccinations cannot be made at the expense of the State Livestock Sanitary Board upon application received after April 1st. For such cases vaccine will be furnished free of charge, but the owner will be required to defray the expense of employing the veterinarian to administer it.
