AFTER VISIT TO HIS SWEETHEART Fred Tyson, twenty years old,

of Watsontown, drowned in the Susquehanna river at that place late Saturday night while trying to swim from the White Deer side to Watsontown. After a long search, in which several hundred men and boys took part, the body was found at 10 o'clock yesterday morning less than ten feet from where he had placed his clothes on the bank of the river. The body was rescued by Grant Leiser, a merchant tailor of Watsontown.
