## new cattle experiment.

The experiment station at the conjunction with the State 1 partment of Agriculture, is
conducting an experiment the effect of different methods of supplying water to tattening cat.
tle and to uscertain at the sume time the most oconomical way of
stabling them. Fifteen steers were divided iuto three lots
five each, all being dehorned. One lot is turned loose in
large boxstall and fed in common manger, while a co stant supply of water is furnish-
ed them in an automatic watering trongh. A second lot is tied in
stalls, each animal being suppilied with water as in the first lot, while the third lot is tied in stanl daily.
