Miss Maud Clarke spent Sunday as the guest of Miss Delphie Truax.

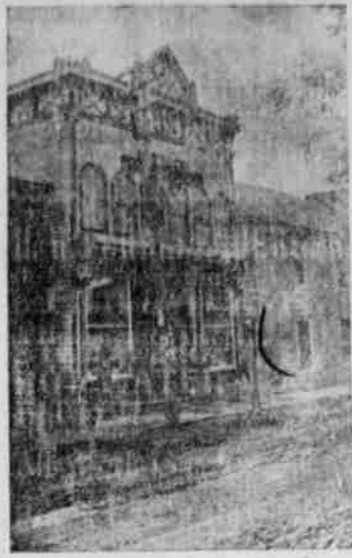
Who will be our next school teacher? is all the talk among the children now.

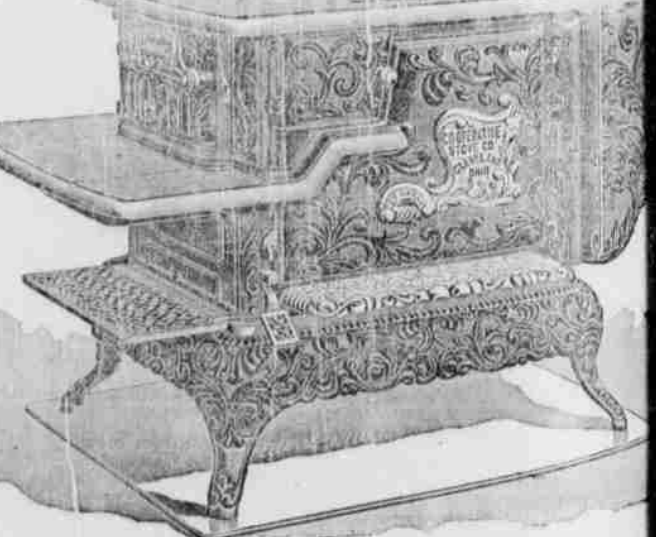
