WHEREAS, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act relating to the elections within this Commonwealth," passed the 19th day of June, Anno Domini 1891, and amended the 3rd day of June Anno Domini 1898, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the general elections and to such notices to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations made, and designate the place at which the election is to be held.

THEREFORE, I, DANIEL SHEETS, High Sheriff of the county of Fulton, do hereby make known and give this PUBLIC NOTICE to the Electors of the county of Fulton, that on

The First Tuesday after the First Monday of November next, being the 6th day of the month,

A general Election will be held at the several Election Districts established by law in said County, and as published below.

Every person excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the legislative, executive or judicial department of the State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office of appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth; and no Inspector, Judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election. Third, he shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty years of age or upwards he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.—State Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1.
