QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS.

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age presenting the following qualifications shall be entitled to vote at all elections. First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have been a citizen of the State one year (or if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then he shall immediately presenting the election. Third, he shall have resided in the election district where he is to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if he shall have been two years a State of County, he shall have been assessed at least two months and held at least one month before the election. State Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1.
