SOME NEW LAWS.

One of the bills passed by the present Legislature may result in stopping the sale of cigarettes in most places, for it is well nigh prohibitive. A license fee of \$25 must be paid by all dealers, and at the usual price 25,000 will have to be sold before the profits pay the license fee.

CANNON CRACKER MUST GO. With reference to firecrackers the new law says:

"That from and after the pass age of this act, any person or persons manufacturing or sell ing firecrackers containing dynamite, chlorate of potash, or any explosive except that containing ordinary gunpowder, composed of sulphur, saltpetre, and char-

coal, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than \$100, or by imprisonment of a term not less than six months and not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court."

TO LICENSE PEDDLERS.

A bill has been signed by the Governor providing for the license of hawkers and peddlers in the boroughs and townships of the State.
