WHEREAS, in and by act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An act relating to the elections within this Commonwealth," passed the 19th day of June, Anno Domini 1891, and amended the 31st day of June Anno Domini 1894, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections and in such notice to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations made, and designate the place at which the election is to be held.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.**  
**PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1.**  
Shall Section One, Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows? Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections, subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. 2. He shall have resided in the State one year (or, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election. 3. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. 4. If twenty-one years of age and upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2.**  
Shall Section Seven, Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows? All laws regulating the holding of elections by the citizens or for the registration of electors shall be uniform throughout the State, but laws relating to the registration of electors may be enacted to apply to cities or for cities of the same class. **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3.**  
Shall Section Four, Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows? All elections by the cities shall be by ballot or by such other method as may be prescribed by law provided, that secrecy in voting be preserved.

The Electors of McConnellsburg Borough to meet at the place lately fixed for that purpose, to wit: The Commissioners' office at the Court House in said Borough.  
The Electors of Union township to meet at the place lately fixed for said purpose, to wit: George Scriber's carpenter shop, near George Scriber's Hotel, in said township.

The Electors of Wells township to meet at the school house, near the Methodist church, in said township.  
Every person excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or who shall be employed in the legislative, executive or judicial department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth; and no Inspector, Judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

**QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS.**  
Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election. Third, he shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty-one years of age or upwards he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.—State Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1.
