Eikelbarner.

License Notice.

It is ordered that all applications for licenses for the sale of wine, beer or liquors, wholesale or retail, for the year 1902, will be heard on Tuesday, the 14th day of January, 1902, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day in the Court room of the Court of Quarter Sessions of Fulton County, Pa., at Chambersburg, Pa. There shall be no communication at any time with the judges personally upon the subject, by letter or any other private way. The petition, verified by affidavit of applicant, shall be in conformity with the requirements of the acts of Assembly, judgment bond shall be executed in the penal sum of \$200, with no bond over and above said judgment bond, the sum of \$200. Bond conditioned for the faithful observance of all the laws relating to the selling or furnishing of liquors, and to pay all damages which shall be recovered against the licensee, and all costs and penalties which may be imposed on him under any indictment for violating said laws; and the sureties shall be required to appear in Court and justify under oath. The Court shall in all cases refuse the application whenever in the opinion of the Court having due regard to the number and character of the petitioners and the character of the application, such license is not necessary for the accommodation of the public and entertainment of travelers, or that the applicant is not a fit person to whom such license should be granted.

Application to be filed with the Clerk of the Court not later than Monday, the 23rd day of December, 1901, and removal of the application to be filed not later than Tuesday, the 21st day of January, 1902. Upon sufficient cause being shown by the party applying, the Court may in its discretion suspend the time for filing the application, and the party applying may, in such case, file a petition for a stay of the application, and the Court may, in such case, grant such stay.
