Grissinger, r. will occur, marked by warmer weather and a general tendency and Nicholas Roettger, r. to rain and snow, and the weather will remain unsettled until about the 18th.

The latter half of February is under the influence of the Vernal Equinox and storms on and about the 18th and 20th, will show traces of tropical influence. Lightning and thunder especially southward, will be natural with rain and thawing, but the northern and western areas of these storms will turn to snow, sleet and freezing.

The storms of the Vulcan period, from the 17th to 20th, will hardly subside until the reactionary disturbances due from the 23rd to the 25th, will make themselves felt; the moon being full on the 21st and 22nd, very early equinoctial storms are probable. Heavy vernal rains will follow the 23rd, and blizzards in the north of snow and sleet will occur. And the month will end with another storm period brewing.
