Discovery of a Bride at the Outset of Housekeeping.

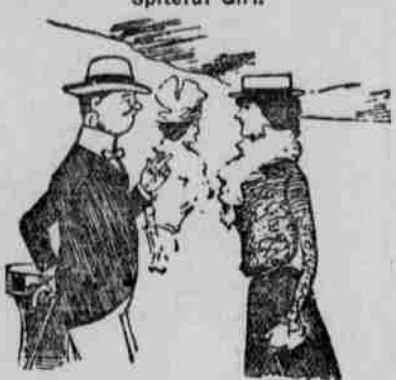
