He impressed me, boy as I was, with his greatness of intellect; and no one could be in his presence without being impressed with his powerful personality. He had undoubtedly one of the greatest legal minds this country has produced. He came to be a familiar figure, and I have often seen him come sweeping down the pike behind his two roans that he drove as he traveled from court to court. The first associate Judges were Hons. Samuel Robinson and Mark Dickson. I do not now recall certainly, who the other county officers were, but I think Daniel Fore was Sheriff and I think George Wilds was Prothonotary. After serving a year or two Judge Black was elected to the Supreme Court and Judge Kimmel, his brotherin-law, was elected in his place. Judge Kimmel was elected as a Whig, but I believe he, later in life, became a Democrat and if I mistake not, is still living. I will not affirm, however, that that is due to his democracy. The first court I think was held in January of 1851.
