Mercersburg is to have electric light. E. B. Diehl and Seth Lemaster, of Lemaster, have contracted with the Schaff Electric company of Chambersburg, to install the plant which will furnish the electricity to the town of Mercersburg and the village of Lemaster. The plant will be located at Bridgeport, one mile from Lemaster, and will be operated by water power. The Schaff company will put a force of thirty men at work on the first of August to string wires, plant poles and locate machinery. The plant will be in operation by September 1, and it is expected that by September 10 the town will be lighted. There are to be 50 street incandescent lights of 32-candle power.
