USEFUL HOUSEKEEPING HINTS.

A wholesale dealer in eggs says one may easily, with a little practice, tell a good egg from a bad one...

Make a poached egg look as delicate as possible. Cut the toast on which it is to be dropped into a round with a muffin ring...

If you have separated the yolk from the white, and in a half shell have the yolk left which you wish to beat slightly for a custard or sauce...

A soft-boiled egg left over from a meal may be boiled over again and laid aside to use cold in a salad, sauce, sandwiches or as a garnish.

If you get a cake too stiff never pour more milk into it. Beat an egg and add it gradually until you get the desired thickness.

Poached eggs as served at a French Canadian table are very much nicer than we cook them. A cup of milk is brought to the scalding point in a shallow granite vessel...

The milk is not allowed to boil, merely kept at the scalding point, and the eggs will be ready in about two minutes with the yolk inside a beautiful pearly film.

Lift them out carefully with a skimmer and set each egg on a slice of buttered, delicately browned toast. Add to the hot milk one tablespoon of butter and one tablespoon of flour...

If there is a mucilage emergency in the household, break an egg and use the white of it, unwhipped for sticking purposes. The white of an egg is the best pasting material that exists for covering jelly tumblers with rounds of paper...

Give a new-laid about a half-minute longer to boil than you would for one which has been kept for some time.

When it is impossible to obtain cream or milk for a cup of coffee you can have a very palatable make-believe cream by heating the white of an egg till light and mixing it with a teaspoon of butter rubbed to a cream.

INCREASED DEMAND FOR LEMONS.

The increased demand for lemons during the hot weather is so great that the commission men are asking an advance of from 25 to 50 cents a box on the stock in hand.

The average cost of a box of 350 lemons is from \$5 to \$5.50. The wholesale prices for lemons in this city are governed by the New York quotations rather than the local demand, though the local demand and supply, as well as other local conditions, have their effect.

Formerly, importations of lemons were made direct from Sicily, but at present Baltimore obtains a great bulk of its acid fruit through New York.

A local authority states that the arrival of lemons in New York amounts to 100,000 boxes per week during each summer. Many of them are consumed in the metropolis, and the remainder are shipped throughout the country.

This city consumes lemons to the amount of 2,500 or 3,000 boxes each summer, a greater part of which is not of the best quality.

About July 1, the prices begin to rise and generally reach the highest point about the first of August.
