Grand Rally For Honest Government!

The Democratic State Organization will open the State campaign at McConnellsburg, Monday, September 15, 1902.

Creasy, state chairman; Hon. John S. Rilling, chairman of auxiliary committee, and Hon. John H. Fow of Philadelphia,—all will arrive at McConnellsburg at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, after which a public reception will be held at the Fulton House, when an opportunity will be had for every one who wishes to shake hands with the distinguished candidates. Two or three bands of music will be on hand to enliven the occasion. The public speaking will be at the Court House in the evening, and overflow meetings will be arranged for, so that every one will have an opportunity to hear the speakers.
