MCCONNELLSBURG.

The first election held for officers for the borough of McConnellsburg, after the formation of Fulton county, was held in the old stone school house which stood in what is now the Presbyterian graveyard, on the third Friday of March 1851, William Hoke was judge of election; Jacob Hoke and William Furry inspectors, and Wm.
