

ATTRACTIVE SCENERY.

Interesting Description of Trolley Ride, by J. W. Brown, of Knobsville.

LEVIN, BUCKS COUNTY, October 16, 1902.—August 27, 1902, William Martz, Daniel Hamill, and the writer began to work for the American Telephone and Telegraph Company on a line extending from Newtown Square, Delaware county, Pa., to Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

We are now within ten miles of the river. The line crossed the Schuylkill river at Port Kennedy. An unbroken succession of beautiful landscapes and objects of historic interest mark the progress of the tourist from Philadelphia to Sanatoga when he makes the trip on a trolley car over the Schuylkill Valley Traction Company's line.

Boarding a Chestnut Hill trolley car of the Union Traction Company's line anywhere along Eighth street in Philadelphia, the tourist is taken between miles and miles of country of the same length in the United States that possesses so many objects of interest for lovers of the picturesque and historical.

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The ride from Norristown to Collegeville, a distance of eight miles, is as pretty a one as the most exacting could demand.—The route runs through some of the richest of Montgomery county's rich farming land. A short distance above Norristown, it passes the palatial residences of John F. Betz and F. A. Poth, two wealthy Philadelphia brewers.

At Collegeville, an attractive little borough, the home of many wealthy men, in the summer time a popular resort for tourists lured thither by the beauties of Parkinomen creek, is situated Ursinus college, one of the oldest institutions of learning in the state.

A visit to the venerable structure, and the old grave yard adjacent, where can be found many curious epitaphs over a century old, will repay anyone.

The route from Trappe to Sanatoga Park, a distance of seven miles, lies through more rich farming land. Sanatoga Park is one of the most attractive resorts of its kind in eastern Pennsylvania, the natural beauties of a picturesque spot having been enhanced by the art of man.

From Sanatoga Park to the business centre of Pottstown, another, big and progressive Montgomery county borough, is a distance of but four miles. The entire distance from Chestnut Hill to Sanatoga is twenty-four miles.

The writer had the pleasure of visiting Valley Forge, the head quarters of Washington, during the winter of 1777-78, and boarded at the house that was Gen. Mifflin's headquarters, and near which was Gen. Wayne's quarters that winter.

PROCLAMATION GENERAL ELECTION

WHEREAS, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An act relating to the elections within this Commonwealth," passed the 19th day of June, Anno Domini 1901, and amended the 2nd day of June Anno Domini 1902, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the general elections and in such notices to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations made, and designate the place at which the elections to be held.

THE FIRST TUESDAY after the First Monday of November next, being the 4th day of the month

Every person excepting Justice of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of any city, or of any incorporated district, whether a commissioner or officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the executive, executive or judicial departments of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the Senate or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office of auditor, judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS.

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections. First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year or if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, he shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty-two years of age or upwards he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election, in accordance with the provisions of Article VIII, Section 1, of the Constitution.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

PROPOSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to section ten of article one of the Constitution, so that a charge of a jury for failure to agree or other necessary cause shall not work an acquittal.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, that the following be proposed as an amendment to the Constitution: that is to say, that section ten of article one, which reads as follows:

"No person shall, for any indictable offense he proceeded against criminally by information, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger, or by leave of the court for oppression or mistreatment of a witness, be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall private property be taken or applied to public use, without authority of law and without just compensation being first made or secured."

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Proposing an amendment to section seven of article three of the Constitution, so that a charge of a jury for failure to agree or other necessary cause shall not work an acquittal.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, that the following be proposed as an amendment to the Constitution: that is to say, that section seven of article three, which reads as follows:

"No person shall, for any indictable offense he proceeded against criminally by information, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger, or by leave of the court for oppression or mistreatment of a witness, be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall private property be taken or applied to public use, without authority of law and without just compensation being first made or secured."

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
