Bedford-Fulton Telephone Co.

From the Everett Press of last week we learn that a new telephone company has been organized in that town, capitalized at \$5,000. Among the officers and directors we notice the names of two well known former Fulton county men, Dr. J. Grant Hanks, and Elijah N. Palmer.

The company expects to build a line to take in the towns of Clearville, Robinsonville, Mattie, Gapville, Crystal Springs, Emma, Akersville, Rays Hill, Graceville and Wells Tannery. At the latter place it will connect with the Sallito Telephone Company, which covers a part of Fulton and Huntingdon counties. It is also expected to have a line connecting with Bedford.

The need of telephone service has been much felt in the eastern part of Bedford county and this company expects to furnish this much felt want. The company is composed of many enterprising citizens of Everett and vicinity who are pushing the work along as fast as it is possible to do so. They will begin erecting lines as soon as all the necessary rights of way and material can be secured.
