YOUR SCHOOL TAX.

Pay It in Time, and Save the Percentage. When to Do It.

All school tax paid on or before October 1, an abatement of 5 per cent, will be allowed. From October 1, to November 1, the full face of the tax must be paid; after November 1, five per cent. will be added and unpaid taxes placed in constable's hands.

The following shows the time and places to meet the treasurers in the districts that have their notices printed at this office.
