GOD SAVE THE COMMON WEALTH.

PROCLAMATION GENERAL ELECTION

WHEREAS, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania...

THEREFORE, I, DANIEL C. FLECK, High Sheriff of the county of Fulton, do hereby make known and give the PUBLIC NOTICE, to the Electors of the county of Fulton, that on...

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square opposite the name of the party of your choice in the first column.

A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate. The voter may insert in the blank space at the bottom of each group, the name of any person whose name is not printed on the ballot for whom he desires to vote.

Table for State Treasurer, Auditor General, and various candidates with columns for Republican, Democratic, Prohibition, Socialist, Citizens, Independence, and Labor.

I also hereby make known and give notice, that the place of holding the aforesaid election in the several boroughs and townships within said county are as follows, to-wit: The Electors of Ayr township to meet at the Public School House near Welester Mills. The Electors of Bethel township to meet at the Public School House at Warfordburg, in said township. The Electors of Brash Creek township to meet at the place lately fixed for said purpose, to-wit: the carpenter shop of C. C. Mellott, at Emmaville, in said township. The Electors of Dublin township to meet in East room on first floor of building, nearly opposite M. S. Witt's Hotel, on lands of said Witt in Fort Littleton. The Electors of Licking Creek township to meet at the place lately fixed for that purpose.

The First Tuesday after the First Monday of November next, being the 3rd day of the month. A General Election will be held at the several Election Districts established by law in said County, and as published below.

OFFICERS TO BE ELECTED. ONE PERSON to fill the office of State Treasurer of the State of Pennsylvania. ONE PERSON for the office of Auditor General of the State of Pennsylvania. TWO PERSONS for the office of Judge of the Superior Court of Pennsylvania.

United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioner, officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the legislative, executive or judicial department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising the office of elector or appointment of elector, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

Table for State Treasurer, Auditor General, and various candidates with columns for Republican, Democratic, Prohibition, Socialist, Citizens, Independence, and Labor.

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election. Third, he shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty-two years of age or upwards he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election. State Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1.
