New Postage Stamp.

The flag stamp, which has been in use for about six months, will soon be superseded by a new design. The stamp will be known as the "shield" postage stamp. The design has been formally approved by the Postmaster General, and the Bureau of Engraving is now making the plates, each containing 400 designs, from which the 4,000,000,000 of 2-cent postage stamps which the people of the United States will require during the next twelve months will be printed.
