The petition, verified by affidavit of applicar shall be in conformity with the requirement of the acts of Assembly. Judgment bond shi shall be in conformity with the requirements of the acts of Assembly. Judgment bond shall be executed in the penal sum of \$500, with no less than two reputable freeholders of the county as sureties, each of them to be a bona fide owner of real estate in the county of Fulton worth, over and above all incumbrances, the sum of \$2500 (or other legal security given) Bond conditioned for the faithful observance of all the laws relating to the selling or furnishing of inpors, and to pay all damages which shall be recovered against the licensee, and all costs, fines and penalities which may be imposed on him under any indictment for violating said laws; and the sureties may be required to appear in Court and justify under outh.

The Court shall in all cases refuse the application whenever, in the opinion of the Court, having due regard to the number and character of the petitioners for and against the application, such license is not accessary for the accommodation of the public and entertainment of strangers and travelers, or that the applicant is not a fit person to whom such license should be granted.


