

Economical Feed For Hogs.

Prof. Kennedy says about economical hog feeding: Where the hogs have a liberal ration of clover pasture and blue grass, with a ration of corn, wheat and oats mixed, of about two parts corn, two parts wheat and two parts oats with eight per cent, oil meal, fed in the form of a thick slop, it will give most excellent results. This will give extra heavy gains, but will not be as economical as a ration which will make heavy gains and is at the same time economical, of four parts corumeal and one part tankage, fed in the form of a thick slop. This is considered one of the best by him.-Tribune Farmer.

## Draining.

The work of draining and ditching land needing this should now receive that they are put in deep enough. No deep, and three feet six inches or four lime, which has been sifted fine, feet is often better. It is not the water that falls on the surface that needs to be gotten away, but that which is stagpant below the surface. Make provisions for this and that which falls on the surface will do no harm. See that drains have sufficient fall to clear themselves quickly, and that a good open outfall is secured. In draining a hillside do not run the drains around the hill. Put in this way they will draw the water from both sides of the drain, whilst a drain run around a hill will only take water from one side.

### Clean Poultry Houses.

There is more or less objection on the part of some poultry keepers to removing the droppings from the poultry houses daily, although this is undoubtedly the best way of keeping this portion of the house clean. If the roosts are located as they should be there will be a dropping board under them, which will receive all the droppings, so that it is easy to remove them with a boe. In cold weather it may not be necessary to remove them daily unless one has a large number of fowls, but they should be sprinkled either with land plaster or with dirt to keep down the odor, as well as to retain their fertilizing value. Do not use lime, for this releases the ammonia in the manure, its most valuable fertilizer. Covered as described each day, the droppings may be removed once or twice a week and the board then sprinkled lightly with lime or with a solution of carbolic acid,


### Rations For Poultry.

Even the novice in poultry raising who has tried feeding considerable vaegg production is thereby materially increased. The one danger in feeding a variety of grains is having too many of them of a fattening nature. In this grade come corn, oats and buckwheat, hence when corn must compose the main portion of the ration it is best that oats or buckwheat be fed only once or twice a week, using wheat and millet to extend the ration. This, of course, refers to laying hens. Taking the grains named as a basis of feeding a good course would be something like this: Monday, mash in the morning. millet in the litter at noon, crushed outs at night; Wednesday, mush in the morning, buckwheat in the litter at noon, corn at night; Thursday, mush in the morning, millet at noon, wheat at night; Friday, morning mash, noon While still somewhat damp rub mash, corn at noon, wheat at night; stout wire gauze, having twenty-five week, and this is done because corn to experiment somewhat in feeding a variety of grains and see what combinations give the best results,-Indianapolis News.

Paints For Farm Buildings. Few things are more pleasing to see in any section of country than well painted farm buildings. They are indi-cative of content and thrift and, even though not always up to date, testify that the owners are in love with their surroundings. But not every farmer can afford to buy patent paints, much less oil and lead, for their barns and outbuildings. This, of course, is lamentable, for any structure should be painted before showing that it needs it badly, one coat of paint then doing better and being far more economical than two coats later, when the surface has become very dry and porous. It is claimed, in fact, that a single coat of bolled linseed oil applied to the paint when it first begins to fade will suffice at that period, and this, estoring both best butter. color and texture, make the surface as good as ever. According, under such a system of treatment, it is advisable to put on, in the first place, three coats of the best paint obtainable. It should be done, moreover, in cold weather, under which conditions it will wear a third longer than when put on in warm or hot weather. 

Bird, acting chemist of the Missouri experiment station, has succeeded in making a dry bordeaux



powder which contains the copper in the same chemical state as in liquid bordeaux. In a recent bulletin he explains how it is made.


The materials necessary to make seventy pounds of the stock powder are pounds copper sulphate, four pounds good quicklime, two and a half gallons water in which to dissolve the attention. Break up into small lumps seventy or eighty pounds of quicklime and spread it out so that it will become air. slaked. When slaked and perfectly dry sift it through a fine sieve of 100 meshes to the inch. Put the copper sulphate in a coarse bag and hang it in the two and a half gallons water until dissolved. Pour gradually two and a half gallons water over four pounds good quicklime in such a manner as to slake it to the finest powder, and give a good milk of lime solution. Put sixty pounds air-slaked lime in

a shallow box where it can be worked over with a hoe. Pour the milk of lime and copper sulphate into a third vessel, and stir until thoroughly mixed, when it will have a deep blue color and be thick. Put this immediately into a double flour bag filter, squeeze out most of the water, and empty the wet blue material at once into the sixty riety during the winter admits that the pounds of air-slaked lime, and work it up so that it will be well distributed. Insecticides such as paris green may be added in the form of powder in the proper proportions. The usual method of preparing a dust spray by slaking the lime with a strong solution of copper sulphate changes the chemical form of the copper to an oxide so that it does not stick as well to the leaves, nor prove as effective as a fungicide.
