AGRICULTURAL.

Economical Feed For Hogs.

Prof. Kennedy says about economical hog feeding: Where the hogs have a liberal ration of clover pasture and blue grass, with a ration of corn, wheat and oats mixed, of about two parts corn, two parts wheat and two parts oats with eight per cent. oil meal, fed in the form of a thick slop, it will give most excellent results. This will give extra heavy gains, but will not be as economical as a ration which will make heavy gains and at the same time economical, of four parts corn meal and one part tankage, fed in the form of a thick slop. This is considered one of the best by him.—Tribune Farmer.

Drainage.

The work of draining and ditching land needing this should now receive attention. In putting in drains see that they are put in deep enough. No drain should be less than three feet deep, and three feet six inches or four feet is often better. It is not the water that falls on the surface that needs to be gotten away, but that which is stagnant below the surface. Make provisions for this and that which falls on the surface will do no harm. See that drains have sufficient fall to clear themselves quickly, and that a good open outfall is secured. In draining a hillside do not run the drains around the hill. Put in this way they will draw the water from both sides of the drain, whilst a drain run around a hill will only take water from one side.

Clean Poultry Houses.

There is more or less objection on the part of some poultry keepers to removing the droppings from the poultry houses daily, although this is undoubtedly the best way of keeping this portion of the house clean. If there are no droppings on the floor, there will be a dropping board under them, which will receive all the droppings, so that it is easy to remove them with a hoe. In cold weather it may not be necessary to remove them daily unless one has a large number of fowls, but they should be sprinkled either with land plaster or with dirt to keep down the odor, as well as to retain their fertilizing value. Do not use lime for this purpose. The ammonia in the manure, its most valuable fertilizer, is volatilized each day, the droppings may be removed once or twice a week and the board then sprinkled lightly with lime or with a solution of carbolic acid.

Rations For Poultry.

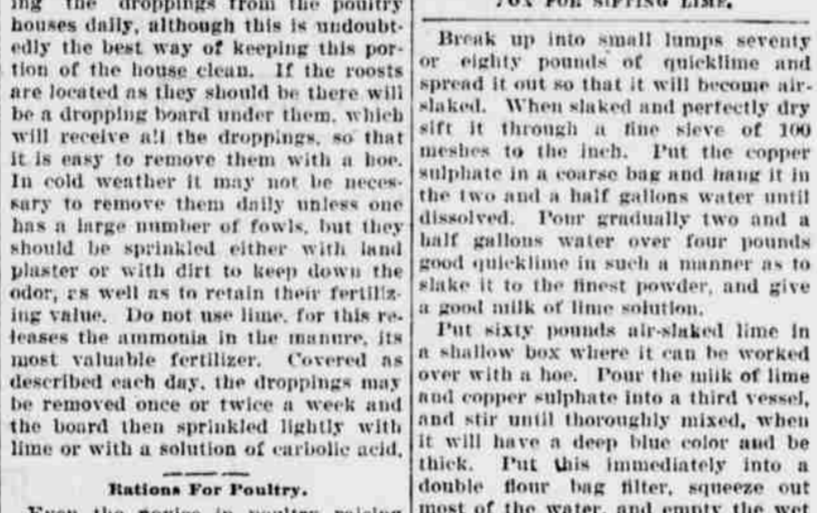
Even the novice in poultry raising who has tried feeding considerable variety during the winter admits that the egg production is thereby materially increased. The one danger in feeding a variety of grains is having too many of them of a fattening nature. In this grade come corn, oats and buckwheat, hence when corn must compose the main portion of the ration it is best that oats or buckwheat be fed only once or twice a week, using wheat and millet to extend the ration. This, of course, refers to laying hens. Taking the grains named as a basis of feeding, a good course would be something like this: Monday, mash in the morning, millet in the litter at noon, crushed oats at night; Wednesday, mash in the morning, buckwheat in the litter at noon, corn at night; Thursday, mash in the morning, millet at noon, wheat at night; Friday, morning mash, noon wheat, night corn; Saturday, morning mash, corn at noon, wheat at night; Sunday, morning mash, wheat at noon, corn at night. If one is in the habit of feeding the warm mash at night, then the morning and night foods are simply reversed. It will be noticed that corn is fed at night four times during the week, and this is done because corn will keep the fowls warmer on a cold night than any other grain. It will pay to experiment somewhat in feeding a variety of grains and see what combinations give the best results.—Indianapolis News.

Paints For Farm Buildings.

Few things are more pleasing to see in any section of country than well painted farm buildings. They are indicative of content and thrift and, even though not always up to date, testify that the owners are in love with their surroundings. But not every farmer can afford to buy patent paints, much less oil and lead, for their barns and outbuildings. This, of course, is lamentable, for any structure should be painted before showing that it needs it, and being far more economical than two coats later, when the surface has become very dry and porous. It is claimed, in fact, that a single coat of boiled linseed oil applied to the paint when it first begins to fade will suffice at that period, and this, restoring both color and texture, makes the surface as good as ever. According to such a system of treatment, it is advisable to put on, in the first place, three coats of the best paint obtainable. It should be done, moreover, in cold weather, under which conditions it will wear a third longer than when put on in warm or hot weather. It is generally a waste of money to purchase cheap patent paints for any purpose whatever. If first-class ones are not to be had there, simply don't buy any but try the following mixture: Fill a tub two-thirds full of skim sweet milk and stir in water line until it is partly thickened. Color it with Venetian red, chrome yellow or the like, as desired, and put it on with a wide brush, rubbing it in some. Keeping it well stirred both in the pail and tub to prevent the lime from settling and leaving the milk too thin; the object is to have it of such consistency that the grain of the wood will show through when putting it on. It should be more of a stain than a thick paint, in which case one can get over a large building with it in a day, hence the cost of it is so small that if a new coat were required every year it would still be less expensive than the application of oil and lead. Happily, however, it will last several years, and has been known, on a rough surface, to endure the wear and tear of the elements to some extent for almost half a century.—Fred O. Sibley, in The Epitomist.

Making a Dry Seedling Powder.

The use of a dust spray, which has been adopted quite largely in orchard



While still somewhat damp rub through a coarse sieve, Fig. 1, made of stout wire gauze, having twenty-five to thirty meshes to the inch, using the wooden block, Fig. 3, to rub it through if necessary; the sifter fits over a box, Fig. 2, which is about 3x3x3 feet. Then spread the material out to dry, and when perfectly dry sift through a fine mesh sieve, crushing all lumps. All except the sand, which is in the four pounds quicklime, should go through the fine sieve. This mixture will keep indefinitely, and contains about three and a third times as much copper per gallon as is contained in liquid bordeaux. It may be diluted with powdered lime or flour, or may be used in this way. If 130 pounds of air-slaked lime or an equal volume of flour is added to seventy pounds of the stock powder, it will have practically the same copper strength as the 4-50 bordeaux mixture. Insecticides such as paris green may be added in the form of powder in the proper proportions. The usual method of preparing a dust spray by slaking the lime with a strong solution of copper sulphate changes the chemical form of the copper to an oxide so that it does not stick as well to the leaves, nor prove as effective as a fungicide.

Dairy Notes.

As a rule large, fat globules make the best butter. Cream rises best when the temperature is falling. A good cow does not, as a rule, eat but little more than a poor one. The dairy cow should not have to travel a long distance for water. Have your arranged to keep your cows comfortable in winter? Feed is costly fuel, but it should be burned to keep the cows warm if they are kept in a cold stable. A cow is different from a child in that she can never be spoiled by too much petting. Speak softly, milk gently and she becomes at once your profitable friend. One advantage with the separator is that all animal matter, dirt and impurities are removed from the milk, and will be found sticking to the outer wall of the bowl. A good way to increase the value of your dairy is to persuade your careless neighbor to do better. In order to accomplish this induce him to subscribe for a good dairy paper. Trouble is the price of success in making good butter, and without it the dairyman will make neither good butter nor a good reputation as a butter maker. Have the utensils sweet and absolutely clean.
