"This case stated involves the constitutionality of the Act of July 9, 1897, P. L. 288 with its amend ment of April 11, 1899, P. L. 43, allowing premiums for the destruction of wild cats, foxes, and minks in this commonwealth.

The act of July 9, 1897, is entitled "An act for the destruction of wild cats, foxes and minks in this commonwealth, and providing for the payment of bounties on the same, officers fees and fixing a penalty for violation o the same.

this proposed legislation is that liability for the bounty and fees. Who is to pay the same? The state, county, or district of the county in which the animals are killed? The title of the act gives no notice of this in any way.

The body of the act provides for their payment by the county treasurer on an order given by the county commissioners, upon production of a certificate of a magistrate, showing a compliance with the provisions of the act.

We are of opinion that this act offends against Article 3. Sec. 3. of our state constitution, because its subject is not clearly expressed in its title, and that it is therefore unconstitutional.

This defect in the title of the act of 1897, was sought to be remedied by the act of April 11, 1899, P. L 43, by merely amending the title.

But the act of 1897 was void and dead, by reason of its infringe ment on the constitution, and could not be resurrected in that

The effort so to do but resulted in an additional constitutional infringement by offending against Article 8.
