In the fail of 1868 Mr. Hill was elected sheriff of this county, defeating Mr. D. S. Mellottof Licking Creek township, and made a popular and capable officer.

Mr. Hill was a man of means, and was generous in his aid to those in need of help.

His funeral takes place to-day, interment being made in the Hill graveyard.
