

the effect that the merchants of Brussels closed their stores, and the bakers and the butchers their shops and refused to sell their goods. This angered the duke to that extent that he threatened to hang all offenders in front of their houses if they persisted in their course. But just at this time the news reached him that an army of refugees and discontented citizens had taken possession of the city of Breil and other cities had thrown off all Spanish authority and formed a confederacy to resist him. This had the effect to draw the attention of the duke to this new outbreak, and the bakers and butchers were not hanged. — About this time also, Prince William of Orange, had returned from Germany and had succeeded in uniting the northern province of Holland, Ireland, Utrecht and Friesland into a union, which elected him as chief stadtholder, and supplied him with funds and men to form an army. Moreover Count Louis of Nassau, brother of Prince William had with a small force of troops, defeated the Spanish General, Count of Areberg, at Heilgelee. All these occurrences only madened the duke the more, so that he ordered his soldiers to take vengeance on these rebellious cities. Lake very demous they entered Harlem, Narden and other cities, plundering every house, murdering everyone that came in their way, and committed such brutish acts as cannot be named, and after their devilish nature was sated, they set fire to the houses and burned them to the ground, in order to cover up their helish deeds. These acts of Alva roused the nation to such a pitch of indignation and anger, that king Philip II saw fit to recall him to Spain. The duke's governorship had lasted six years, it now being the year 1578.

DUKE ALVA'S HIGH HANDED REIGN.

Another Chapter on the Early History of the Netherlands.

Consternation seized the assembly as a general massacre seemed to be the object of such maneuvers; but it was only the leaders of the anti-Spanish faction, which the wily duke aimed to secure before they would take alarm and escape out of his net. So the first ones arrested were Count Egmont and Count Hoor; also twenty-five other noblemen of less celebrity from all parts of the provinces. After these arrests were successfully made the knights were not molested and could go in peace. The news of this highhanded proceeding caused another 20,000 of the best citizens to flee from the country before every avenue of escape would be closed by the Spanish troops.

As Margaretta was not consulted in regard to these acts of the duke, she felt herself slighted, and conceived an aversion to Alva to such a degree, as to ask her brother the king, to relieve her of the office of governess which he granted to her without opposition. She took up her residence in Italy receiving a yearly pension from the king, and was no more noticed by him as long as he lived. Margaretta had now been governess of the Netherlands nine years.

When Cardinal Granvilla, who having been recalled to Madrid some years previous heard of these arrests, he asked: "Have they got the silent one? (The silent one was Prince William of Orange, who doing his service at the emperor's court at Madrid was known as to always keeping silent, never expressing his opinions.) When he was told that the prince had escaped, he said:—"Then they have got nothing as long as he is at large." And it proved to be the truth.

The duke now organized a council of twelve with the Spaniard Vargas as president, to try and dispose of all prisoners. The council did its work in such a manner, that it is known in history as the council of blood. Egmont and Hoor, with the other twenty-five knights were decapitated in the market place of Brussels on the 5th day of June, 1568. In this same year, the Grand Court of the inquisition in Spain condemned to death every citizen of the Netherlands, Catholics as well as Protestants, high and low rich and poor.

Now, Duke Alva had every one's life and property in his own hands and whosoever did not lose his life had to consider it as a gracious gift of the duke. Not a day passed, but there were executions in the market house of Brussels. Men of high rank were decapitated, common citizens hanged by the neck, but Protestant preachers were burned at the stake. All the property of the victims became the property of the crown.

An overhead mail carrier has been invented, says an exchange, which it is claimed, can be operated at the rate of forty miles an hour. The inventor says a circuitous route of fifty miles can be covered with ease in two hours leaving at each farm house its consignment and picking up the mail to be sent out. Farmers will be served more regularly and expeditiously than city people. — With rural telephones, mile an hour mail delivery and fast trolleys the farm may outbid the city in popularity.
