**Adulterated Salt.**

Even common table salt has not escaped adulteration at the hands of unscrupulous dealers, according to the reports now being prepared by chemists under instructions from Dr. Warren, dairy and food commissioner. Within a few days the pure food agents will summon more than a score of persons for selling adulterated table salt. Just what the dealers use as an adulterant has not been made known, but of 40 samples, purchased at various places by the agents the chemists report that they found 36 of the specimens adulterated. Dr. Warren has ordered his attorney to begin prosecutions and action will be taken as soon as the chemical reports are complete. The crusade against adulterated foods, Dr. Warren says, will be most complete this year. His agents are securing specimens of everything which the people eat and drink, and persistent violators will be prosecuted.
