THE NETHERLANDS.
Another Chapter of the Early History, by Henry Wolf.

The new governor was Louis of Zuniga and Requesense, who endeavored to bring about a better condition of affairs, but failed, as he could not reduce taxes, high as they were; for he could not raise sufficient funds to pay off the soldiers, who had not received their wages for a long time. This caused great insubordination among them; and they became so troublesome that the insurgents would not consent to lay down their arms. Emperor Maximilian II also offered his services as peacemaker, but to no avail. Although the governor gained a victory over the union army at Nymwegen where two brothers of Orange gave their lives for the cause of freedom, he nevertheless was defeated at Leiden, where, after being besieged into starvation, the heroic population of that city cut the great dikes, flooding thereby immense bodies of their best farm lands, which deprived them of many a harvest and caused other great losses—but it also flooded away the Spanish army. A Protestant university was the reward for this heroic sacrifice of Leiden; for in the same year the northern provinces at the synod of Dordrecht had accepted the catechism of Heidelberg and established Calvinism as the state religion; and by secularizing all existing church property had increased their fighting force.

many cities. It now became the conviction of King Philip that Orange was the source of all this trouble in the provinces, and so determined on his destruction.—He had already put the Prince under bond, the year before; but now he offered a great reward in money and the rank of a nobleman to any one that would bring him to him dead or alive. Several conspiracies of the priests, against the Prince's life were frustrated, but the bullet of the fanatic Gerard of Franche Comte did its work, he fell dead in the doorway of the palatial dining hall at Delft, July 10, 1584. The assassin was seized at once, and instead of receiving the expected reward, was executed on the spot by the furious populace. The death of the founder of the liberties of the Netherlands, did not in the least cause their destruction. Orange's second son Maurice became stadtholder and chief of the army, while Oldenbarneveld became minister of the interior. But the successful operations of Parma in putting himself in possession of Ghent, Brussels, Mechelen, Nymwegen, and even Antwerp—convinced the Dutch people, that they could not singly, with out outside help, withstand the most powerful kingdom down in Europe. So they offered to Queen Elizabeth of England the protectorate over the Netherlands; she accepted it and sent Count Leicester with an army for their protection, 1585.
