



The new Spanish Governor Don Juan being very desirous of peace entered into a treaty with all the states; but as the article on religious liberty was not very clearly defined, the states of Holland and Zealand withdrew, and kept up hostilities. Soon the rest of the states suspecting the insincerity of Juan withdrew also, the state of Brabant, electing Orange their stadtholder. So the enemies of the crown increased daily, which fact weighed so heavily on bottles free. Governor Juan that he died.
