EPIDEMIC OF SUICIDE.

Six Persons who Have Destroyed Their Own Lives Since the First of May.

While many people are traveling up and down the face of the earth seeking a climate that will be more favorable to the extension of life, or who are spending the last cent on skilled physicians and surgeons in the hope that they may remain as long as possible in this world, there are others—many it would seem—who are planning to assist the death angel to get them into eternity at the earliest possible moment.

Jane Harris of Wells Valley, aged 70, on the 2nd of May, John Armstrong of Mercersburg, aged 30, on the 6th, and Elder James B. Seibert, aged 50, of Fannettsburg, on the 7th—have already been mentioned in this paper, and now we have three more: Chester R. Whitcomb, aged 25, a former resident of Bedford and a graduate of the Bedford High School, class of '95 shot himself through the head with a revolver Sunday afternoon the 15th inst.

Bruce Kennedy, aged 28, a brother of our townsman William Kennedy, hanged himself in the attic of his sister's home in Green castle, last Friday evening. Mr. Kennedy had been in poor health and had just returned from a Philadelphia hospital a few hours before.

The sixth is that of ex-County Superintendent Frank H. Snyder of Franklin county. Mr. Snyder was about 50 years of age, was county superintendent in Franklin county from '87 to '93, taught school last winter, and conducted the teachers' examination for permanent certificates at Chambersburg, a few days ago.
