UNCLE SAM'S WONDERS

All Executive Departments Send Treasures to the World's Fair.

Display Installed In the Largest Governmental Exposition Building Ever Constructed - Precious Documents - Relics of Famous Statesmen and Soldiers. Working Postal Exhibit.

The United States Government building at the World's Fair occupies an elevated site just south of the main picture of the Exposition. The great central dome of the Government building is visible from the very center of the Fair, looking across the picturesque sunken garden that lies between the Palaces of Mines and Metallurgy and Liberal Arts.

The hill slope in front of the Government building is terraced with broad stairways almost completely Co., of Chicago, to discover how tric Bitters will quickly dismemcovering the slope. The building is 800 feet long by 250 feet wide and is the largest structure ever provided at an exposition by the federal government. It is distinguished from all the other large buildings at the Exposition by the steel truss construction, the entire roof being supported by steel arches, forming a splendid domed ceiling.

In this building are installed the exhibits of all the executive departments vast storehouse of an endless variety of treasures dear to the beart of every true American. Precious documents are to be seen here, and the autographs | Trout's drug store. of our great men of the past are on display. Relics of famous statesmen and soldiers, carefully preserved through generations, are exhibited. Each governmental department has installed an exhibit showing its official duracter and mode of operation.

Entering the Government building from the eastern end, the visitor sees at his left a railroad postoffice car. This is not a mere coach standing idle,

This exhibit shows what new executive department stands for and what it is accomplishing. Mr. Carroll D. Wright, United States Com missioner of Labor, had charge of the preparation of the exhibit. Charts arranged by him, showing the rapid growth of the nation in agriculture, arts, manufacture, population, etc., are of special interest to sociologists and all students of the labor problem.
