By a law passed by the recent legislature of that State all applicants for marriage licenses upon applying to the Probate Court for legal permission to wed are required to answer the following questions:

Is either party a habitual drunkard?  
Is either an epileptic?  
Is either insane?  
Is either under the influence of an intoxicating liquor or drug?

The happy swain who hereafter goes to the Probate Court in Ohio for a license must be prepared with some knowledge of his own and his fiancée's habits and state of mind and body. Doubtless the questions will seem impertinent or insulting, and certainly no one but a probate judge would dare to propound such inquiries. However, as the queries will be printed on record forms, the would-be bridegroom will probably look upon them merely as another device to make him as uncomfortable and foolish as possible at this momentous crisis of his life and fill them out as well as his confused intellect will allow under the circumstances.

Meanwhile other States will watch with interest Ohio's experiment in matrimony along a line in which progressive thought has been moving for many years.
