Dead Laborer Leaves \$35,000.
An examination of the estate of Patrick Maley, who died last week in Harrisburg, has shown that the value of it is probably \$35,000, consisting mainly of cheap lodging houses located in Harrisburg and Steelton. Included, however, in the property, is the Kelly Hotel at the foot of Third street, and Hotel Hurst, Lewisberry, York county. In the absence of issue and a will, the estate will be equally divided between his brother and two sisters.

Maley's life was a peculiar one of almost niggardly striving for the accumulation of wealth, and though a mere laborer on a cinder dump at only a little over a dollar a day, he accumulated a fortune of no modest proportion. During the greater part of his life he was employed by the Pennsylvania Steel Company, entering their employ at the age of nineteen shortly after arriving in this country from his home in Ireland.
